of implementing a systems approach for continual improvement in order to re-engage learners, help them to feel a

sense of purpose in their learning and provide them the tools they need to become independent learners. By adhering to the rigorous standards established by the Baldrige framework, standards that the most successful organizations across the nation

use to achieve high

performance, Urbandale is able to more fully align goals throughout the entire District—from the student level, to the classroom level, to the building level, to the district level, to the Board level—with one clear aim: to systemically advance student achievement.

"The IRPE process and Baldrige Framework have been instrumental in creating and sustaining UCSD's systemic approach to continual improvement," said UCSD Director of Quality and Continual Improvement Denise Wood. "The reports from the examiner teams have provided UCSD with the feedback necessary to continue our system improvement efforts."

Receiving the Silver Leadership Level award in 2015, marks the third consecutive year UCSD has been recognized for achieving greater and greater levels of performance excellence. Although the awards are indeed a great honor, they are not the reason the District maintains its focus on continual improvement—that reason

can only be found in the positive impact continual improvement is having on student engagement, achievement and

success. The District is tracking a trend in improved Iowa Assessment scores,

The teams learned more about what types of work students were engaged in when they weren't receiving instruction in small group, what the flow of the literacy block looked like, and how teachers fit in the five big ideas of literacy

each day. Those five big ideas for K–5 include phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. Ballard staff were able to take advantage of the opportunity to get outside of their walls to see all the great work going on around them. Collaborative practice is something all of the UCSD teachers enjoy!

The feedback the teams received from Ballard included the following:

- amazed by all the data collected and how it is made public to students to impact progress in a safe learning environment

- all students seemed to be SO engaged in their work even while teachers were meeting at tables with small groups

- impressed with the structures and routines in place in the classrooms from the very youngest of learners all the way to 5th grade
- impressed by the knowledge of the Wonders resource and how teachers seemed to know how to adjust and best meet kids needs while still staying on pace with the materials
- super positive classroom climate; all students seemed so comfortable talking about what they were doing and learning

modeling for the younger students, and as the year continues, students in grades 4, 3, 2, 1 and kindergarten get to the read them over the intercom. Announcements include birthdays for the day, hot lunch menu, "shout outs," and the Pledge of Allegiance. Mrs. VanRoekel, the school secretary, assists students by having them practice the night before and by helping them to get out their jitters right before reading them for all to hear!

Spring Running Club

During the 2015–16 school year, the students at Karen Acres have had the opportunity to participate in a fourteen week running program. Students are able to jog on the Karen Acres track during lunch recess while parent volunteers tally laps for each student. Students are able to earn mileage tokens for every five miles completed. Students who complete 50+ miles will be rewarded with a trophy and students who complete thirty days of the program will be invited to an end-of-year pizza party.

This program is a way to increase physical fitness levels, improve academic performance, and promote self-esteem. Students have taken advantage of the nice spring weather and participation has increased tremendously during the spring session.

Webclickers

Students in 4th and 5th grade are given the opportunity to join an after school club called Webclickers. Lead by 4th grade teacher Julie Crowley and 1st grade teacher Angie Sime, there are 48 students involved this year who meet on alternating Wednesdays. Each year the students select a new technology skill they wish to learn. For the 2015-16 school year, Webclickers have focused on using the application iMovie to make movie trailers about Olmsted.

STAR Clubs

All Kindergarten through 5th grade students meet in multi-age groups called STAR Clubs to learn together, give input about school events, build relationships with students and adults outside their classrooms, and have fun. Each STAR Club has approximately 15 students and two adult leaders. When students are assigned to a STAR Club, they remain in that same STAR Club each year until they leave us after 5th grade. Recent STAR Clubs have been focused on students



coming up with behavior expectations for four different areas of the building hallways, lunchroom, restrooms, and recess. Students were asked what being Safe, Trying their best, having a positive Attitude, and being a Respectful citizen would look like, sound like, and feel like in these four areas. Students also shared what an appropriate voice level would be for each of the areas. Olmsted staff has been reviewing the ideas shared by students as we make decisions about behavior expectations in the building. When students are able to share their ideas about appropriate behavior, they have a sense of ownership and understanding about what is happening and what is expected.






Watch D.O.G.S.

"She makes hard lessons really easy. She is also super nice," said Wyatt King.



Students competed in three areas: a sumo-style competition where one pre-built robot tries to push the other robot off a circular mat, a real-time robot challenge where students must build a robot that can write the words, "It is fun!" (pictured below) and a robot that can climb stairs, as well as present a community service project promoting Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) in their local area. At the conclusion of the competition Team Urbandale, also known as Kylo-RAM, finished with a strong second place—the highest place finish by an Urbandale team in the history of HyperStream. Plus, teammate Riley Stuart was selected by Workiva of Ames as the recipient of the IT Olympics Student Leader Award and a \$1,500 scholarship. Check out UHS HyperStream robots in action.



Students Solve Business Challenges

Critical thinking, group collaboration and effective problem solving skills are fundamental for 21st century learners and are at the core of the fourth-annual Langford/lowa Quality Center Student TEAMS (Training in Evaluating, Analyzing, and Measuring Systems) training where UHS students partner with business executives in order to solve existing challenges. Two groups of students participated in training sessions over the course of two days where they learned critical problem solving tools and how to systematically improve work processes. One group of

students then partnered with business executives from Bridgestone Americas Tire Operations to better understand an existing manufacturing challenge while a second group of students partnered with Heartland AEA to examine a challenge dealing with varied school use of digital technology. Both groups applied what they learned through the Student TEAMS training in order to present a solution to Bridgestone, Heartland AEA and District leadership.

"TEAMS was incredibly helpful," said UHS student Raj Oberoi. "We've learned about the PDSA problem solving classes in school, but actually applying it to a real problem that Bridgestone had was incredibly helpful and fulfilling to see how our hard work paid off."
